# **TREASURERS REPORT** Geraldina Alwarez

In my first year as the Treasurer for the Springvale Neighbourhood House I have been impressed by the amount of detailed information and support shown at every finance sub-committee meeting in preparation for the finance report at each Governance Committee meeting. As a new treasurer, this support has been invaluable. As a Governance Committee member.

I see the dedication of our manager and finance worker in ensuring good financial management for the organisation.

This year, a decrease in revenue due to the loss of a contract delivering accredited English Classes at Doveton College and key staff leaving demanded a close monitoring of the finances during this period. Please note that the full impact of these changes resulted in a 4.1% decrease in revenue and 9.5% higher expenses compared to 2022.

Our main sources of revenue were funding from the Department of Families, Fairness & Housing, City of Greater Dandenong, Skills Victoria and ACFE. We also received small grants for community projects – from City of Greater Dandenong for bicultural workers & Harmony Day festival, Neighbourhood House Vic for Carers project & Law Week, Jesuit Social Services for Climate project, Good Things Foundation for Online Week and Liverwell for World Hepatitis Day. Also received Living Local Fund from Dept of Jobs Precincts & Regions and Digital devices grant from Good Things Foundation and were able to secure, laptops, tablets and charging stations.






### FINANCIAL REPORT Ann Pathmasiri



The revenue for SNH this year is \$62k less compared to last year. There has been increases in ACFE funding and community engagement & responsive grants (Social Prescribing, Friendship Café, Carer's Project, Climate Project, Equipment, and small projects) for SNH this year. The income from room hire and community bus hire also saw an increase post-Covid, and the organisation received additional income through subcontracted staff. The decrease in the overall revenue was mainly due to losing income as a result of the termination of one of our contracts to deliver classes at a school in Doveton.



Our expenses increased by \$145k over the year. In 2023, SNH went back to face-to-face delivery of classes which saw an increase in venue hire and class resources. During the year a few staff including three long serving staff left the organisation. End-of-employment payments (unused entitlement) and recruitment cost for new staff added to the increase in expenses for the year. Springvale Neighbourhood House had an overall deficit of \$199k this year bringing down our total equity to \$138k.



## MANAGER'S REPORT Melanie Virtue



This year marks many milestones for Springvale Neighbourhood House, as we celebrate our 40th anniversary. Over the years,

our House has always been a culturally safe and welcoming place where community members can come together, learn, grow, and find a sense of belonging.

2023 is also my 10th anniversary as manager of Springvale Neighbourhood House. I will be forever grateful to the governance committee for entrusting me with this position, leading an organisation where we make a difference in the lives of our community.

Over the past year, we have faced a number of challenges including reluctance of community members, volunteers and students to return to onsite programs/classes, and difficulty recruiting emergency teaching staff.

After surviving the pandemic lockdowns with all staff onboard, sadly, this year eleven staff resigned including two of our three-person management team. Collectively, these staff had worked for our House for 95 years. That's a lot of experience and knowledge to replace, however change always presents opportunity and we took the opportunity to restructure our organisation.

The new structure included recruiting a new deputy manager, who has a wealth of experience in both learn local and RTO management to manage our Learning Centre site. We also shared management responsibility across five positions – Manager, Deputy Manager, Administration & Finance Coordinator, Community Program Coordinator, Quality & Compliance Coordinator. This makes our House more resilient and less reliant on any one position for organisational knowledge and skills.

I'd like to acknowledge the lasting impact that our first deputy manager, Kelly Cooper made on our organisation over the past eight years and wish her well in her new position managing Park Orchards Community House and Learning Centre.

Finally, I would like to thank the governance committee, staff, community leaders and volunteers for their support and for making our house such a great place to work.

We acknowledge the support of the Victorian Government, Department Family, Fairness and Housing and City of Greater Dandenong for funding our house and supporting its development and we look forward to continuing to grow our house and the programs for this community.

### LEARNING CENTRE REPORT Alicia (ameron



The Learning Program has had its ups and downs over the past year, but is overall finishing on an up. We bid farewell to some of our tutors, and wish them all the best, and also welcomed new people.


Throughout the 2022 – 2023 year, 107 students undertook accredited Skills First training in English language and 173 undertook pre-accredited ACFE training in English, digital literacy, and work skills, with many students enrolling in multiple courses.

Our students were born in 41 countries, with the majority from Afghanistan, Vietnam, Cambodia, and China. These students attended classes at 11 different locations across five suburbs, at places such as SNH and the SNH Learning Centre, schools, churches, and other community halls and centres.

We also ran other community classes, such as the Be-Connected digital literacy classes for seniors and free conversation clubs. These programs allow those who are ineligible for funded classes an opportunity to still learn and practice English and digital literacy skills.

The dedication and progress of all students has been fantastic to see, especially the 17 students who said on their enrolment form that they didn't speak English at all and who have now all learned English basics.

We're really proud of every student who had classes with us this year, and look forward to seeing them again, whether in classes, in other activities, or anywhere else.



A huge thank you to everyone who worked so hard to make this a great year – students, tutors, admin staff, volunteers, committee members, and everyone else who contributed to the Learning Program in any way.

# OUR COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

### **Carers Project - NHVIC**

Working in Partnership with Neighbourhood House Victoria and Carers Victoria, we have supported carers and 'hidden' carers in our community to be linked to learning, job opportunities, respite care services, financial counselling, social connection, peer support services as well as migration support.

### **Social Prescribing Project**

Our Social Prescribing Project is funded by the City of Greater Dandenong to link socially isolated and lonely participants to activities, programs and services run by Neighbourhood House & Community Organisations in the area - including Women's Friendship Cafe, Men's Clubs/Sheds, Art & Craft groups, English & Computer classes.

### Work & Development Permit Scheme (WDP)

As a WDP sponsor for the Victorian Department of Justice & Safety, we helped **274** vulnerable and disadvantaged people with a non-financial option to address their fines debt. A total of **\$128,792.80 has been worked-off** through enrolling in English & Digital classes, and/or volunteering in classrooms, activity groups and letter-box deliveries. A total of **\$97,206.62** still remaining to be worked-off. One WDP participant now facilitates our new weekly men's club.

#### Women's Friendship Cafe

Since starting the Friendship Cafe's post-COVID19, we have seen an increase of participants. We now have 40 regular participants joining weekly - with new members coming in each week. Participants find it a safe space to socially connect with their friends, or have an opportunity to make new friends that come from many different cultures under one roof where they can share their experiences, learnings and get creative together. The most wonderful thing to see is the friendships they have formed within the group that enables them to meet outside the centre during school holidays, or for coffee catch-ups.

# **OUR COMMUNITY PROGRAMS**



#### **Community Leaders Forums**

The community leaders forums, held quarterly, play a vital role in our community by offering informative sessions on topics of utmost importance to our communities. Community leaders gather to learn about different topics on health and well-being such as Diabetes, Mental Health, Anxiety & Depression, Hepatitis Health, COVID-19, Mindfulness and other topics such as Australian Law & Wills, Composting, NILS Loans, Centrelink, My Aged Care etc. The forums serve to increase awareness on services and resources available for communities, promote health and wellness and encourage sustainable practices. The sessions are well attended with 30-40 participants from different countries such as China, Somalia, Afghanistan, Iran, Vietnam, Sri Lanka, India, Africa, Spain, Mexico, Australia, Cambodia, Greece and Italy ultimately contributing to a healthier, more informed and eco-conscious community.

#### **Material Aid**

We worked with Aumsai Sansthan Temple & Lee Tarlamis to distribute 100 food kits to individuals and families in need from our local communities. This work was supported through the Victorian Government's Priority Response to Multicultural Communities grant program.

#### FoodBank

Collaborating with FoodBank has provided us with the opportunity to assist the vulnerable and disadvantaged individuals and families in our communities. We have successfully distributed 300 food vouchers to the most needy in the community and continue this partnership.

#### **Sick Pay Guarantee - NHVIC**

Working with Neighbourhood House Victoria on the Victorian Sick Pay Guarantee provides eligible casual and contract workers with a guarantee they will receive sick pay when they can't go to work. Recently their pilot program has been extended and is fully funded until 2025 - including adding 400 new jobs to the eligible jobs list.

#### **COVID-19 Safety Assistance**

COVID continued to affect the lives of our community and onsite attendance. We employed bi-cultural workers through the CALD Communities Taskforce, Local Partnership project of City of Casey, City of Greater Dandenong and Cardinia Shire.

# **OUR COMMUNITY PROGRAMS**



#### **Senior Public Housing**

Since the COVID-19 pandemic, we continue to run social connection sessions at two public housing sites in Noble Park weekly. The sessions are a safe space for residents to share their experiences, make friends with neighbours and play games! These sessions provide Social Work students with the opportunity to support residents individually if needed. We are also re-introducing Monash Health to have regular health-related sessions for the residents.

#### **Power Saving Bonus**

We are extremely happy to report we have assisted 358 people apply for the Power Saving Bonus in the last 12 months - a total of **\$89,500** of support through the Victorian Government Energy Assistance Program.

#### **Be Connected**

As one of the network Partners with the Good Things Foundation, we are successfully running digital literacy classes for older people to learn how to navigate through their digital devices, stay safe online, learn how to access services such as MyGov, Centrelink and book appointments online easily.

#### **Climate Resilience Project**

Springvale Neighbourhood House worked with community leaders, Jesuit Social Services Centre for Just Places and City of Greater Dandenong to build awareness about climate risk and to identify how we can better prepare for more frequent and extreme weather, within our organisation and wider community.
